


How America's Schoolchildren Helped Save the Statue of Liberty

The response was overwhelming. Children emptied their piggy banks, sold lemonade, and even organized street performances to raise money. Within


a year, they had collected over \$100,000 (equivalent to millions of dollars today).

On October 28, 1912, the newly restored Statue of Liberty was unveiled to the public. The children of America had played a pivotal role in saving one


of the nation's most cherished landmarks.

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
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
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
